### Activities Week Talks

Cambridge has a rich tradition of learning and research which we have been able to tap into this week. Year 6 heard about the role the city and university have played in developments in computer discoveries (Dr Winsey). Year 3 learned about Cambridge's contribution to the study of genetics (Dr Liu) before making DNA models with sweets (Dr Papatheodorou) and Year 5 were able to study genetics through the medium of Harry Potter (Dr Papatheodorou again!). The importance of DNA sequencing was explained to the children before they extracted this from strawberries (Dr Ellershaw). Various activities helped them understand the immune system (Dr Coggle).

The children learned from a haematologist (Dr Sturgess) about red blood cells and how to grow stem cells before using a nutrient mixture and incubator for their own practical. They also learnt about the heart and blood vessels with ultra-sound equipment before racing around outside as they 'carried' blood around the body (Mr Hayes and Dr Hayes).

Moving to other areas of anatomy, children learnt how the brain works as a processing centre for a variety of sensory inputs and how it can fill in gaps via perception tools (Dr Shenker). In an insight into paediatric orthopaedics (Dr Ashby), the children could see not only how broken bones can be fixed but how bones can be surgically stretched to make them longer, and Year 6 experienced an amazing insight into the complex world of surgery (Mr Jawaid).

If a little downcast at the diseases and issues with the body, there was time to have some respite with understanding the science behind construction and architecture (Dr Sinclair) which involved marshmallow and spaghetti structures and all of Year 3 taking away their own goodie bag! There has been lots of study of net-zero construction with Year 3 considering what to think about when designing buildings (Mr Carter) and Year 4 constructing their own wind-powered circuits and turbines and testing this out with a hair dryer (Dr Sinclair again!). Year 5 have taken this to another level as they studied green architecture (Dr Sinclair for a third time!). Children also uncovered the secrets of rocks, including the best rock type to build the Eurotunnel, as they handled fossils and learnt about geology from around the world (Mrs Keen).

We had an assembly from the Charity *Cultivating Change* which inspired us to get into the garden more to link with nature (Sally Nye and Rosie Ferrandino) and every child has been presented with a sunflower seed to cultivate – a summer challenge is to grow the tallest flower! Year 5 have become more expert at managing their waste even more sustainably (Mr Crisp from Cambridgeshire Recycling). Children also experienced a Virtual Lab, explored Our Changing Planet, tried dissection origami, 'built' flowers and invented their own science board games. Moreover, Year 6 also heard from a commentator on BT Sport (Sam Roberts) who gave tips about journalism, public speaking and coping with the excitements and stresses of working on television.

The impressive variety of talks and workshops, many delivered by Perse parents, is a real tribute to the thirst for knowledge and intellectual curiosity in our school community. My thanks go to everyone who contributed to this outstanding learning opportunity for the children.













