# Wellbeing Week

The last week has seen an array of different activities as we celebrate our tenth annual Wellbeing Week, also held at the Pelican this year too. A huge thank you to Laura Robertson, and the rest of the staff, for running such a variety of experiences, all of which help the children (and us adults!) to get better at selfmanaging emotions and feelings.

Across all four year groups, we have squeezed in the following: BMX biking and an assembly on failing and learning including <u>a stunt jump over the Head and</u> <u>Assistant Head Pastoral</u>, orienteering, dance, drama, disability volleyball, first aid, mindful painting, rock art with Year 12 students, completing a whole school kindness display, weaving, raft building and launching, Indian dancing, making comfort matchboxes, looking at emotions cards, generating worry monsters, plantings salad seeds with charity *Cultivating Change*, inventing super heroes, designing playground challenges, playing mental health bingo, completing a mind maze and discussing resilience. We have worn green



mental health ribbons donated by Dr Balasubramanian which remind us to be kind and caring to our friends and family, to take care of our minds and to listen and be there for others who need a friend – all of which is particularly relevant considering the difficult situation in the Middle East – we send our best wishes to those with friends and families caught up in this situation. Communal singing has featured heavily, including the Year 3&4 Choir rendition of *You Raise Me Up* and Year 5&6 Choir *You Will Be Found*. These will be reperformed in Assembly on Friday 17 November when parents may attend, although it might be standing room only! ### NSPCC Speak Out, Stay Safe

As part of our Wellbeing Week, we have participated in this NSPCC programme for children aged 5-11 which, in an age-appropriate way, aims to help children understand about abuse and to speak out if they are worried. This child friendly programme is aligned with the curriculum and consists of age appropriate virtual assemblies and supporting classroom based activities. ### Political and Economic Outlook

Last week the Labour Party reaffirmed its commitment to charging VAT on school fees and removing business rate relief from the independent sector. The policy is designed to raise additional revenue to be spent on state education. As Mr Elliott explained in his letter to parents on 7 July 2023, the imposition of VAT on school fees and the loss of business rate relief will lead to Perse fees rising. However, the extent of that increase will depend on the details of any legislation, including the rate at which VAT is charged and the services on which it is charged (it is possible that some services, for example, school lunches and after-school care could be exempt). At present we do not charge VAT on fees, but nor do we recover VAT on expenditure. If the VAT status of schools was to change, we would anticipate being able to recover VAT on inputs, including some VAT on buildings constructed in the last 10 years, via the Capital Goods Scheme. As such, the net effect on The Perse will require detailed calculations that can only be done once the specifics of any future VAT scheme have been announced. However, as a large 3-18 school, The Perse benefits from economies of scale so we can seek to mitigate the impact on fee increases where possible through careful planning, cost control and by growing non-fee income streams, such as international schools and the hiring of facilities.

### NHS Advice for Parents on illness and missing school

It can be tricky deciding whether or not to keep your child off school when they are unwell. The NHS has provided the following guidance <u>Is my child too ill for school? - NHS (www.nhs.uk)</u> to help parents decide whether their child should be kept off school or not. This guidance refers to coughs, colds, sore throats, temperatures, vomiting and diarrhoea as well as a range of other illness and infectious diseases.

## Hockey – IAPS Regional Champions and qualification for the National Finals



# Lost Property – how it works!

Lost Property can cause significant stress in most schools; however, very few have their own *Lost Property Management Service* (!). Almost giving credence to the children's belief that teachers actually sleep at school, early bird Annelise Sanders, our Head of Year 6, sets off on her daily journey around the main Prep site just before 7.00am each morning to collect up any lost property items:

- Any named property is put on children's pegs.
- Unnamed water bottles are displayed by the table tennis tables.
- Unnamed lost property is kept at the front of her classroom and is toured around Form Rooms by her Year 6 helpers every day except Friday.
- On Friday, unless the weather is poor, all unnamed lost property is laid out for view on the table tennis table beside the flagpole.

It is the responsibility of the children a) to check their peg in the morning, b) listen to the helpers when they visit each morning, c) check the Friday display and d) visit Ms Sanders' room to check on the lost property.

## Safety to and from School

With the dark soon upon us at the end of the school day, I would like to reiterate the importance of safety for your children. Thank you to parents for confirming with Mr Knowles (<u>tpknowles@perse.co.uk</u>) if you child is making their own way to or from school by themselves.

Half term can also be a good time to check on hi-vis equipment for all those cycling to school; it is impressive to see so many arriving at school on two wheels, or by foot.

My thanks to all the parents who attended last week's AGM where co-chairs Melissa Whelan and Liz McDade and secretary Lucy Crosby celebrated and acknowledged the significant work of the PPP over the past year. The treasurer, Stacy Sinclair, reported that a staggering £13,500 is once again being donated by the PPP this year, with funds split between the PPP charity *The Red Hen Project* and the children's charity *Guide Dogs*, and also the School for a particular tangible project.
