Lent Term Form Concerts



There will be two guest speakers presenting on the evening:

Professor Neil Lawrence who is the inaugural DeepMind Professor of Machine Learning at the University of Cambridge, leading the University's flagship mission on AI, AI@Cam. He has been working on machine learning models for over 20 years and recently returned to academia after three years as Director of Machine Learning at Amazon.

Dr Anthony Cox who is a computer scientist and bioinformatician who led the expansion of AI and machine learning capabilities in the UK when he was working at Illumina. He is currently a visiting researcher at the Wellcome Sanger Institute, Cambridge.


The Perse recognises the importance of embracing this new era of innovation, and has launched the pupil Perse AI Club and the Perse AI Forum for OPs & parents to explore the impact of AI in education.

Perse Oman

The Perse has always been an outward looking school, and we are excited by the opportunities created by Perse Schools overseas to enrich the learning of Perse Cambridge pupils as we prepare them for life in an increasingly globalised, complex, and inter-connected world. The income generated by Perse schools overseas is also a welcome source of additional funding that keeps a downward pressure on Perse Cambridge fee increases.

As previously announced, The Perse has formed a partnership to open a 3-18 co-ed school in Muscat, Oman. The Omani partners, who are funding the project, will begin construction shortly. The school, designed by Squire and Partners, is located adjacent to the Sultan Qaboos Mosque, and will have some of the best facilities in the region. The architectural drawings below give a flavour of the project. Unfortunately, The Perse Singapore is being rebranded as Invictus Bukit Timah on 31 December following a change in ownership of our Singapore partner.
